## Academic US History

GPA: 4.0

Time Frame: 1870- 2012

This is the same time frame that you will need to know for the EOC test in April

# This class is geared toward preparing for the EOC in April

#### Workload:

- Homework is whatever you don't complete in class
- Test reviews are in your booklet at the end of each unit
- Studying for tests/ quizzes done outside of class but review days in class

#### Writing:

- Small in class paragraph responses to questions each unit
- One longer writing assignment each semester



## Dual Credit US History

GPA: 4.5

#### Time Frame: 1491- Present Day

Second semester will cover the content for the EOC

#### Workload:

- Students have homework most nights in the form of watching a video lecture in preparation for the next day and completing a brief assignment.
  - Videos are usually 15-20 minutes (although a few are longer) and the assignment takes about 5 minutes.
- Additional homework assignment once or twice a week.
  - These will take about 20 minutes.
- Students also have a semester project (that they have all semester to work on) and an assignment over a book read outside of class.

# Grading

Percentage breakdown.

- Exams 30 to 35% of semester grade.
- Online Quizzes 25% of semester grade
- Book Discussion 10%
- Semester Project 15%
- In-Class Activities 15%
- Engagement Activities 5% (this is mostly video lecture homework)

Work is completed on a semester basis rather than a 6-weeks one

- 3 exam grades each semester
- Semester project
- Book discussion over a monograph that they read outside of class
- 5-7 online quizzes
- ~15 in-class assignments
- "engagement" grades



## Writing:

- There will be some form of writing on all three exams.
  - This consists of identification paragraphs, connections paragraphs, and/or essay questions.
- A paper for semester project
- Complete about 5 smaller essays
- 10-15 paragraph assignments over the course of the semester.
- The book discussion is also in writing form (an online discussion board).

#### How do l earn HCC Credit?

- To be considered passing at HCC, students must earn a D to get credit (that is an average of 60-69).
- That converts to a 72 for their high school grade.
- There are specific (HCC designated) dates that you are allowed to drop if the class is not a good fit → Must drop to academic.




## AP US History

GPA: 5.0

#### Time Frame: 1491- Present Day

Second semester will cover the content for the EOC

- All work and content is geared toward preparing for the AP Exam in May.
- Students are expected to take the AP Exam and are required to complete all review activities, assignments and assessments as though they are taking the AP Exam.
- Students will complete a rigorous AP Exam review, and this will count as a major part of the final 6 weeks average.

## APUSH Workload:

Advanced Placement U.S. History is a college-level course that will require a tremendous amount of self-discipline, independence, and responsibility.

Success in this course and on the A.P. exam will be a function of each student's commitment, work ethic, and willingness to meet the instructor half-way.

Students have reading homework most nights (~4-5 pgs/night due weekly)

Reading quizzes over the content each unit (~1/week)

In class document analysis and discussion based on reading homework and in class notes.

Excellent preparation for a college level course.
