# Differences Between Elementary and Junior High



### **Comparing Elementary and Junior High**

#### Elementary

- 1-3 teachers
- Class length (1.5 hr-6 hrs depending)
- Travel in groups with teacher
- Recess
- Lunch few choices
- Electives during specials
- Homeroom



#### Junior High

- 7-8 teachers
- Class length 45 minutes and advisory
- Travel independently
- PE
- Lunch more choices
- Elective class
  - Fine Arts: choir, theater, art, band, and orchestra
  - Other Elective: Lead Worthy (Intermed)
- No Homeroom teachers, counselors and AP serve as student's support team

### Academic vs. Katy Advanced Placement (KAP)

An **academic** class is a course designed to meet state/district standards and ensure students develop the knowledge and skills required for each grade level. The curriculum is vertically aligned to progressively build on prior learning, preparing students for success in subsequent courses. These courses allow for more time to review concepts.

A **KAP** class is a course designed to meet state/district standards and ensure students develop the knowledge and skills required for each grade level. These courses are more challenging and fast paced. They require more independent learning and homework and prepare students for AP classes in high school and beyond.

### What students select during course selections

All students select the following:

- 4 <u>Core courses</u> student can choose Academic or KAP level English Language Arts & Reading course - 2 periods Math course - 1 period Science Course - 1 period Social Studies Course - 1 period
- 1 <u>PE Course</u> 1 period Boys/Girls PE or Pre-Athletics
- 1 <u>Fine Arts/Elective Course</u>- 1 period Fine Arts Options (Theater, Art, Choir, Orchestra, Band) Leadworthy Intermediate



Parents and students need to review <u>Off campus PE information on this webpage</u>

Eligibility is based on the numbers of hours per week a student participates in their activity.

15+ hours - a student does not have a PE class in their schedule and they leave school one period early

 at least 5 hours a week - a student does not have a PE class in their schedule and they have an extra elective course

### Students who receive support services

- Students can choose academic or KAP core courses during course selection in SchooLinks
- Students can choose an elective course (Fine Arts or Leadworthy Intermediate)
- Students can choose their PE (boys or girls)
- If your student receives support services through programs such as special education, ESL, 504, MTSS or GT, the services may continue into the next grade level, and the counselor will update courses selections pending information from your child's support services meeting.

# Junior High Relationships at School and Home



### **Making Friends: Social Relationships**

- Students come from 2–8 different feeder elementary schools
- Each class is filled with a different mix of potential friends
- Talk about social skills (What is the motive behind what we think and speak)
- Joining Groups-Finding a connection with your school





### **Parent/Child Relationship in Junior High**

- Student and social relationships become most important
- Listen, Encourage and Support
- Communication is vital
- In the Developmental LifeSpan: Junior High is a time for trying on different personas, until they find the one persona that feels safe and comfortable.
- Allow for Autonomy



### **Conversation Starters**

- Rate your day on a scale of 1-10. What made it that?
- What three words could describe your day?
- Are you looking forward to anything for tomorrow?
- What was the most challenging part of your day?
- Is there anything that I can help you with?
- If you could do any moment from today over again, what would it be? Would you change anything?
- If you could buy anything for your school, what would it be?
- If you could do anything with any classmate, who would it be and what would you do?
- When you think about the other students at school, was there anything that concerned you?
- Do you have someone at school that you feel comfortable talking to? Who would that be? Why?

- What was the most rewarding part of your day?
- What made you laugh today?
- What was the best thing that happened at school today?
- If you could choose, who would you like to sit by in class? Why?
- Were you able to help anyone today? Did you need help with anything?
- What do you think you should do more of at school?
- If you were teacher, what would you do?
- What did you do for others today?
- What is one positive thing you did today?
- What is one positive thing you saw happen today?

# Characteristics of a Successful Junior High Student



### **Characteristics of a Successful Junior High Student**

#### Problem Solver

- Problems in elementary & junior high are usually not big.
- $\circ$  How do we teach problem solving?
  - Let them solve their own problems.
  - Provide empathy.
  - "How do you think you are going to solve this problem?"
  - Ask for permission to give ideas.
  - Don't save them from the consequences of their solution.
  - Start with small problems.

#### • Decision Maker

- Decisions in elementary and junior high are not usually high stakes.
- $\circ$  How do we teach decision making?
  - Let them make their own decisions.
  - "Wow, that's a tough decision."
  - "Do you want to talk through the pros and cons?"
  - Don't save them from making the wrong decision.
  - Start with small decisions.

## **Graduation Requirements**

- Earn 26 credits
  - Foundation High School Program with Endorsement
- Meet standard on 5 STAAR tests
  - English I
  - Algebra
  - Biology
  - English II
  - US History

\* An ARD committee may determine if the above is appropriate for each student serviced under special education.



### Endorsements

An Endorsement is a specialized area of focus, containing a sequence of courses in a specific area of study. To earn an Endorsement, students must complete a coherent sequence of courses for four or more credits which includes one advanced course in the designated program of study in addition to their other graduation requirements.

- Business & Industry

# Earning Credit and Classification **Standards**



# Credit

- What is a credit?
  - A credit is a unit measuring a student's completion of a high school course.
- How are credits earned?
  - A passing grade earns a 0.5 credit each semester for each course.
- How does attendance affect credit?
  - Students must maintain 90% attendance each semester to earn credit (even with a passing grade).
- Are there any classes that do not earn credit?
  - Yes, like study hall or student assistant.

\*Once credit is earned, a student may not retake that course.



# **Classification Standards**

Grade level classification is based on number of credits earned each year.

# GPA

- Understanding grade points
  - GPA points are based on <u>semester</u> grade averages.
  - High School credit courses <u>are included</u> in the GPA
    - Courses taken in the Fall and Spring
    - High School credit courses in Junior High
    - Summer School
    - Virtual courses



## Rank

- How is rank calculated?
- Rank is first calculated in the spring of 9th grade
  - Numeric rank for top 10% ONLY
    - Quartile rank for all other students
    - 4th Quartile is not ranked

## Tips for PARENTS

Allow **ROOM FOR GROWTH** and trust them to have the resilience to figure it out.

# **Course Levels and Formats**

# Academic vs KAP Courses

An **academic** class is a course designed to meet state/district standards and ensure students develop the knowledge and skills required for each grade level. The curriculum is vertically aligned to progressively build on prior learning, preparing students for success in subsequent courses. These courses allow for more time to review concepts.

A **KAP** class is a course designed to meet state/district standards and ensure students develop the knowledge and skills required for each grade level. These courses are more challenging and fast paced. They require more independent learning and homework and prepare students for AP classes in high school and beyond.

## KAP & AP Courses

- KAP courses in high school are more rigorous than junior high
- AP courses are more rigorous than KAP courses
  - More time/effort required to be successful
  - College-level
- AP courses are controlled by College Board
  - Nationwide curriculum; AP/College Board-trained teachers
  - AP exam offered in May for each AP course
  - Students/parents pay for AP exams
  - Results of AP exams (scale 1 5) determine possible college credit
  - Each university has guidelines as to which AP exams are accepted

# **Dual Credit Courses**

- Partnership with Houston Community College
- Students must meet eligibility requirements
- Taught on KISD campuses by HCC and Katy ISD instructors

# Virtual Course Offerings

- Katy ISD offers a variety of virtual courses in order to provide instructional day flexibility to meet students where they are.
- Student can plan to take virtual courses during the summer, fall and spring semesters.
- Some virtual courses will be offered for free as a part of the 7 period school day
- Tuition based virtual courses can be taken by students outside of their 7 period school day

# **Online Course Selection - 4 year plan**




All **students** select the following:

# Off campus PE

Parents and students need to review the <u>Off campus PE information on this</u> <u>webpage</u>

Eligibility is based on the numbers of hours per week a student participates in their activity.

- First year of off campus PE *will* count into GPA.
- Levels 2,3 & 4 are for Elite level only and can be GPA exempted
  - 15+ hours (Elite level) PE credit is earned through an approved facility & student leaves school early
  - 5 hours a week PE credit is earned through an approved facility
